The smaller photo is of a belt buckle owned by John Geoghegan. He remembers that in the 1930's a shed on the Episcopal Church property contained relics of the organization, and he was a allowed to have one, the belt buckle.

Since the picture is labeled as 1912, it seems unlikely that this was any sort of youth program in preparation for World War I. The background in one photo is the picturesque Trinity Episcopal Church. The other shot is nearby on Ash Street. Can anyone enlighten us with regard to this organization of 99 years ago?
