## Carnegie's Legacy

On September 18, 1895, Wisconsin's Secretary of State Henry Casson signed a charter enabling the formation of The Free Public Library of the City of Baraboo. This year, as we approach the 125<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the charter, we reflect on forces, events, and people who have made a great difference in the history of the institution that is currently called the Baraboo Public Library.

When the newly expanded library is dedicated in 2022, its new name will be the Carnegie-Schadde Memorial Public Library.

The name will honor the family of Juanita Schadde, whose \$2.5 million donation helped make the library expansion project possible. The Schadde family have been long-time Baraboo proprietors of Schadde Plumbing and Heating,

founded a few years before the date of the library's charter.

The other half of the library's future name, Carnegie, honors the wealthy industrialist who donated the initial sum of \$15,000 for building Baraboo's current library. Andrew Carnegie, who made his fortune from iron and steel manufacturing and construction, was described as merciless and cutthroat in his business practices and labor relations. His single-minded determination to succeed was evident from his days working as a bobbin boy in a textile factory as a 13-year-old immigrant to Pennsylvania. He had attended school for only a few years before coming to the United States with his family. As a teenager, he borrowed books from a wealthy local man who allowed young workers to use his personal library. Carnegie also petitioned the director of his local subscription library to allow him to use the library for free, rather than pay a subscription fee. As Carnegie put his knowledge

and resolve to work, he took on positions of greater responsibility, took calculated risks, and by the time he sold Carnegie Steel Company in 1901, he was the richest man in the world.

Over the intervening years, he developed a philosophy of philanthropy. In 1889, he described this philosophy in an article, The Gospel of Wealth: Wealthy people should eschew extravagance, irresponsible spending, or selfindulgence. Instead, they should use their wealth

> to reduce the stratification between the rich and poor.

Carnegie said his early experiences educating himself with borrowed books no use to which money could be applied so productive...as the founding of a public library in a community which is willing to support it as a

convinced him that "there was municipal institution." Starting in the 1880s, he used his own fortune to build nearly 1,700

public libraries in cities and small towns across the United States.

Carnegie believed that in a democracy, education was the responsibility of "the state." His endowments, therefore, were conditional, requiring each community to pledge to support the library's operations with annual appropriations.

"Carnegie's philosophy brought to the doorstep of citizens and immigrants alike not only the means for self-education and enlightenment but also the opportunity to understand the history and purpose of our nation's democracy, to study English, to be taught new skills, to exercise the imagination, and to experience the pleasures of contemplation and solitude."
