PROJECT BACKGROUND

- 2001 First space needs analysis since 1982 addition (Himmel & Wilson).
- 2005 Smart Growth City of Baraboo Comprehensive plan identified need for expansion in plan period (2005-2015)
- 2007- 2010 First building committee does RFP, hires OPN, resulting \$8mil design proposed.
- 2009 Feasibility study. Purchased adjacent property 222 4th Ave, signed Option Agreement with Methodist Church. Fundraising started.
- 2013-2015 Project revisions, capital campaign planning. Project scheduled for 2020 on City Capital Improvement Plan.
- 2016 Creation of Upgrade Review Committee
- 2017 URC reports to library board recommending Ad Hoc Upgrade Review Committee to evaluate the project to date and report to library board.



WHERE WE ARE NOW

- 2018 July Based on 2021 construction date from City Capital Improvement Plan, library board hired MSA/QE for Schematic Design at a Phase I cost of \$175k paid from library building funds raised since 2001.
- 2018 August New City Capital Improvement Plan drafted moving library project to 2028 construction. Council requests further information on library building project to proceed.

90% of survey respondents said they highly agreed.

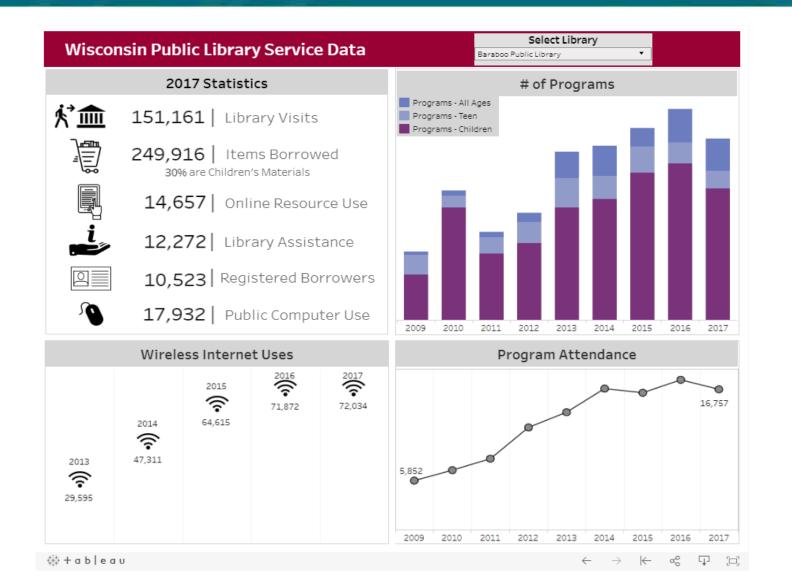

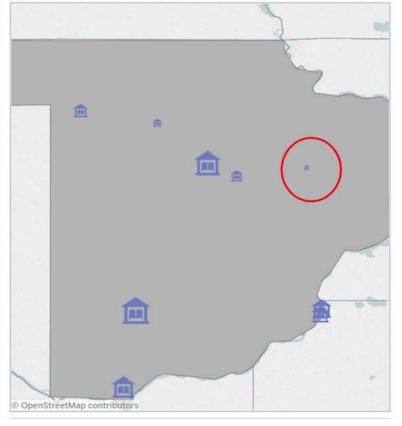




I. INVEST IN OUR FUTURE

WHY?

- ❖50% increase in population
- Expensive to maintain current building without updates (est. capital outlay of\$430,000 will be needed to keep building functional until 2028)
- ❖ Falling behind other libraries in our county, and losing County operating revenue as a result (5% since 2007)
- Our community enthusiastically supports capital investment in the library

Our community supports capital investment in our library

A list of possible improvements was provided in the community survey. These are the improvements that had more than 75% of responses indicating they are a Medium or High priority:

	High	Medium	Low
Remodel the children's area	48%	38%	14%
Have more comfortable spaces for reading, working, and relaxing at the library	42%	43%	15%
Update restrooms	39%	39%	22%
Add more computers	38%	41%	21%
Add more private/quiet areas	34%	45%	21%
Improve accessibility to and display of library materials and space for new types of materials	33%	49%	18%
Provide dedicated collaborative work and creation spaces	26%	50%	24%
Create library space just for teens and tweens	26%	53%	21%

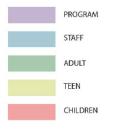

PROPOSED FUNDING SCENARIO

Proposed Budget Appropriations:

\$1,500,000 Library Contribution from donor funds \$8,900,000 City Contribution/Borrowing via CDA (potentially less from any major contributions, and less potential \$900,000 net Community Development Block Grant, which the project is eligible for, application due May 2020 for 2021 project)

\$10,400,000 Total Project Budget

Library contributions to date:

\$101,000 architectural fees 2009-2016 \$395,000 222 4th Ave property acquisition 2009-2010 \$175,000 Phase I architectural fees 2018-2019 \$45,000 partial parcel property acquisition 2019

TOTAL \$716,000 spent to date

2021: \$10,370,000

2028 :\$13,600,000

GLOBAL SCHEMATIC BUDGET PROJECTION WITH OPTIONS

2021: \$10,935,000

2028: \$14,340,000

WITH IMPROVEMENTS NEEDED TO MAINTAIN BUILDING TO 2028

\$14,770,000 (difference of \$4.4 million)
